The process of selecting a Golden Gloves team to compete in the national tournament at Chicago in February will be one step nearer completion tonight when semifinal bouts are scheduled in the Auditorium. The bouts will begin at 8 o'clock and advance sale indicates a very capacity house.

The greatest of three Golden Gloves tournaments sponsored by The Journal, the current meet has been productive of some of the most spectacular bouts ever presented in a Sioux City ring. Better than any contestants in previous meets, the boys taking part in this tournament have provided stirring action throughout.

**Close Fights Seen**  
Tonight's semifinals promise competition as close and keenly fought as the preliminaries. Of the 17 bouts listed, at least 10 are certain to carry all the thrills that make Golden Gloves boxing the best of all sports entertainment. Heading the list are the Thompson-De Cure and Jory-Hertrick bouts in the 147 and 135-pound classes, respectively. They are evenly matched in ability and experience and all four have ardent supporters in this section.

The two bouts in the middleweight class are, through the luck of the draw, matches between boxers and punchers. Carroll Corrigan, hard hitting Spencer, led, will face the clever Andrew Madson of the Pandoras Indians in the 147-pound class. Madson, who has been a very successful amateur, will meet the fairly boxer, Frank Worthington of Edinburg, in the other.

In the 115-pound class, Z. C. Johnson, who won from Tommy Chase in the quarterfinals, will meet Frank Anderson, a curiously hard hitting boy from the Pandoras. Anderson, who must box twice tonight, facing Johnny Gates of Pandoras in the last bout of the evening.

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**Other Features**  
There are other feature bouts, too. Jim Coney, whose sensational victory over Darrell Somke still is a subject for conversation among boxing fans, will meet Albert Greve of Pandoras, a veteran of the Pandoras. The winner must box twice tonight, facing Johnny Gates of Pandoras in the last bout of the evening.

In addition, every bout and despite its possibilities would require too much space. Yet to night any bout of interest is mentioned would be unfair. The highlights are probably the bouts discussed previously. But every other bout on the program seems just as good.

Generally, there are plenty of good ones remaining for both tonight's semifinals and Friday's finals. Fans, however, are advised to reserve their tickets as early as possible because of the advance demand for choice locations. The box office at the Auditorium will be open all day today and Friday and reserved tickets will be sold until 7:30 o'clock each night after which they must be placed on general sale.

Wayne Armstrong of Newcastle has agreed to box Leo Mahon, of Sioux City, after first being scheduled in the event he changes his mind. Armstrong will be replaced by Lee Hall of Kingsley who will be ready to substitute.

## HAWKS DEFEAT DENVER 'U' FOR FOURTH IN ROW

**Stephens, Bobby Show Way to Victory in Close Battle**

Sioux City, Ia.—The University of Iowa basketball team made their first win here Wednesday night, staying off a last minute rally to defeat the University of Denver, 34 to 30. Iowa's reserves took charge in the second half after the regulars had established a 19 to 11 lead, but were barely able to hold the visitors in check.

Ben Stephens, slender Hawks forward, took high point honors, although Al Bobby, senior guard, followed closely. Stephens hit four baskets and four free throws, with Bobby totaling 15 points on seven shots.

Denver proved the most serious threat to Iowa's going to date, displaying a smooth fast breaking attack, coupled with a new type of play for the defense which at times baffled the home team. The visitors were handicapped when James Babcock, brilliant senior center, was injured early in the game with an ankle sprain.

Denver jumped into an immediate lead on a basket and gift pass and held it for 15 minutes. Then Stephens found his basket and put the Hawks in the lead, 11 to 9.

Bobby, who took his cue from Stephens, whipped in a pair from set out on the court and was aided along by Elmer Terrell, Earl Walsh and Sam Johnson to establish the Hawks' half time margin.

Stephens and Bobby again took charge to open the second period, leading the Hawks to a 26 to 20 advantage in a brief interval.

The Hawks were materially aided by the setting of 19 of 24 possible 18 free throws.
