University To Honor Don Meier

Six persons who have achieved success in their respective fields across the nation and the world will receive honorary degrees at the University of Nebraska's 97th annual commencement exercises June 1 in Pershing Auditorium.

One is Donald T. Meier, son of Mrs. John Meier of Oshkosh, a conservationist and creator of the television series, "Wild Kingdom," Chicago, a native of Oshkosh.

president of Don Meier. Meier Productions in Chicago, received a bachelor's degree in business administration from the university in 1941. During WWII he trained personnel for the army's war-time finance operations and became a lieutenant colonel. He then turned to television and for 10 years was associated with the National Broadcasting

Among the early well-known shows he developed was "Zoo Parade" which was carried on the network eight years. After producing several safari films, he created the program "Wild Kingdom," now in its sixth season. The program is carried to 40 countries and is viewed by an estimated 45 million people each week.

Karl Herman Lobner was born in the village of Goldhausen, in Saxony, Germany on March 17, 1878. He was one of seven children born to Heinrich and Henrietta Lobner. He grew up and received his schooling in Germany, and in the year of 1907 after having served in the German army as a drummtr in the 88th regiment, he came to the United coming to Garden States, county.

He made his home with a friend Gustaf Rentzsch in the Blue Creek community. A short time later he and a brother Adolph acquired a homestead some 11 miles northeast of Lewellen where he spent the last 61 years of his life farming and ranching.

In December of 1913 he was united in marriage to Miss Francis Adams of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, and to this union were born four children all of whom survive him.

As a youth in Germany he was baptized into the Lutheran Faith and was a member until his death.

Mr. Lobner was preceded in death by his wife, three brotwo sisters and one grandson Kurtis who passed away in 1967.

Survivors are his one daughter Mrs. George (Erma) Seibert, three sons, Alex and Connie all of Lewellen and Karl of Fairbury; one sister living in Berlin, Germany; and 8 grandchildren.

Funeral services for Karl Herman Lobner were conducted Monday, May 27 at the Grace Lutheran church in Lewellen, with the Rev. Warren Churchill officiating.
