In the second quarter, Ronnie Regier ran 35 yards for the Spartans second score and Mik Vlasin carried for the two point conversion. Culbertson got their only score making it 14 to 8 at the half.

In the third quarter, Ronnie Regier got another six - pointer, and Mike Vlasin got the two point conversion. Cliff Ogg carried three yards for the Spartans fourth score, and John Poltack kicked the extra point. Poltack threw a 43 yard touchdown pass to Ronnie Regier and Pat Lee carried for the conversion. At the end of the game, Wheatland scored 37 points, and Culbertson scored 8 points.

### PHEASANTS TOPS AREA GAME

The beginning of the cold days of November marks the time for hunters to clean out their guns and get out their long woolen socks.

The hunting season is well underway in Nebraska and more openings are scheduled soon. This means it is time to review a few facts on hunting.

Topping this areas game is the ring-necked pheasant. Corn or milo fields are prime spots for this game bird. Other likely spots are near water areas, such as drainage ditches, potholes, and farm ponds. On windy days, hunters should work bottoms and weedy hollows. Although morning usually produces the best results, pheasants can be taken at any time. In the afternoon, loafing areas such as thickets, hedgerows, deserted farmyards, or weedy cover near abandoned buildings may produce results.

Safety and legal rules are always important to remember. Countless number of people are injured or killed each year because of careless accidents. The Nebraska hunting guide, available at places selling hunting permits, gives information on both the legal and safety aspects of hunting.

He was a member of the United Methodist Church and faithfully gave his services through the years.

In 1965 the Perlettes retired from the farm and moved to Grant.

John was preceded in death by his parents, one brother and one sister. He leaves to mourn his passing, his beloved wife, Hannah three daughters, Mrs. Dorothy Ford of Madrid, Mrs. Geneva Storer of Lewellen and Mrs. Shirley Stephens of Ord; ten grandchildren, other relatives and a large circle of friends.
